Sacred Hearts Academy Lower School

Forty-six fifth graders, accompanied by teachers **Susan Phillips** and **Angela Sanborn** and 14 parent chaperones, excitedly embarked on the annual class learning trip March 8-10. At Camp Mokuleia on the North Shore, the students' adventures focused on increasing their awareness of the island environment, promoting teamwork and problem-solving skills and enhancing self-esteem and confidence. The students explored the problem of opala, or rubbish, harmful to native flora and fauna. In groups, the students collected and picked through debris, identifying items which could be ingested by the locale's albatrosses. The camp's location, free of the bright lights of the city, also gave the group an amazing nighttime canvas to stargaze. And, using the stars like a compass, they learned basic celestial navigation techniques used by ancient Hawaiians. The highlight of the trip was tackling the **high ropes course**, suspended up in the tree line. While daunting, the fifth graders were encouraged by their peers on the ground, with many facing their fears to successfully navigate to the course's finish line! Maryknoll School

Furthering its going green efforts, our school installed **photovoltaic panels** on its high school and grade school buildings. The PV project is part of a statewide effort of the **Diocese of Honolulu** to use the collective bargaining power of its churches, schools and other facilities to save money while promoting the use of renewable, environmentally friendly energy. The systems are being paid for by a third-party investor, **CC solar**, under a 20-year power purchase agreement. According to **Larry**

Gilbert of Kairos Energy Capital, the grade school will offset approximately 6.4 percent of the campus load, while the high school system will offset about 19.3 percent of its load. Further engineering studies are being conducted to determine whether other types of energy storage would be cost-effective for a future phase. Mahalo to **HECO**, **CC solar**, and **Kairos Energy Capital** for partnering with us and allowing Maryknoll School to continue toward our commitment in creating sustainable energy and a better environmental future.
